The Early Psychosis Professional Educational Event

On April 12, 2017, The UMass Psychotic Disorders Clinical & Research Program hosted the Early Psychosis Professional Education Event at UMass Medical School. The event featured didactic presentations, panel discussions and a Q & A component to speak about services available for patients in the early stages of psychosis. This included conversation about early detection/prevention, coordinated care and educational resources available for patients in the Central Massachusetts area. Representatives from various distinguished academic institutions, government agencies, community based mental health organizations, and patient advocacy groups in the greater Boston area were present. 
