B1. Life Vest: The Wearable Defibrillator Kathleen Sims, MS, ACNP, UMass Memorial Medical Center

People who are at risk of sudden cardiac arrest have treatment options that will protect them in the event of a lethal arrhythmia. This wearable defibrillator can save lives while long term treatment plans are being formulated. This talk will focus on the patient selection, system components, ease of use and efficacy.

B2 Care of the Patient with Critical Neurologic Illness: We Are Not All the Same Wilev Hall, MD

Patients with neurologic disorders have unique needs when those illnesses require admission to the critical care unit. While these patients are susceptible to the same complications as those with medical and surgical disorders, the target vital signs, management parameters, and treatment thresholds must often be adjusted to maximize recovery of the nervous system. The audience will learn these key differences and enhance their understanding of how we balance systemic critical care with strategies designed to allow the neurologic condition to recover.

B3 Small Steps - Big Savings! - The Nurse Manager's Role in Reducing Resource Utilization Jay Cyr, RN, MS, MBA

Too often in healthcare finance and operations we focus only on changes that save large amounts of money, when often numerous smaller steps may make the same—or better— financial impact. Leading those changes, be it in an acute care floor, ICU, ED, OR, Cardiac Cath Lab setting or even the outpatient clinic or procedural area is the responsibility of the clinical nurse manager. In this presentation nurse managers will gain insight on how their role as clinical expert and source of financial information can have a substantial effect on the cost of care for their patients. Several practical examples will be used. By fully embracing their leadership role, the successful nurse manager can drive change that will result in better care at a lower cost.

12:30pm-1:20pm Tracheostomy: The Nuts and Bolts

Paulo J. Oliveira, MD

Tracheostomy tube insertion is now a common procedure performed in the ICU setting especially in patients requiring prolonged mechanical ventilation. Learning to care for such patients as they transition out of the ICU to the general medical floors or to a variety of rehab and long-term acute care facilities is becoming more and more important. This presentation will familiarize participants with general care of the patient, the types of tubes used and the procedure itself focusing on bedside percutaneous dilatational trachs. Evidence based medicine will be provided regarding the timing of trach tube insertion in the acute care setting and a comparison to the more traditional surgical approach. Complications - both early and late-will be covered such as inadvertent decannulation.

C1. Ischemia, Injury, Infarction: Interpreting the 12-lead ECG Terri Mazzarelli, MS, APRN-BC

The 12-lead ECG is an invaluable tool for health care providers practicing in all areas: emergency department, critical care units, medical-surgical units, and ambulatory care areas, to assist in diagnosing electrical abnormalities. There is a wealth of data obtained from interpreting the 12-lead ECG of patients experiencing acute coronary syndrome, arrhythmias, and electrolyte imbalances. Knowledge of cardiac electrophysiology and normal waveforms provide the foundation from which to diagnose and treat a myriad of pathophysiologic disorders. This presentation provides an overview of basic 12-lead ECG waveforms with an emphasis on changes associated with ischemia, injury, and infarction.

C2 Alarm Fatigue: the Consequences of Noise Robert Spicer, RN

Technological advances in monitoring patient conditions and the equipment that accompanies acute and critical care environments bring both a blessing and a curse. Hospital staff work in a noisy environment that either points them to refocus their attention to the call of the alarm or to ignore that call. In this presentation, we will explore the history of technology in the modern hospital setting as it relates to this dilemma. We will explore the psychology of the human response to the noise created by this cacophony of sound and the research which helps us understand that response from

the perspective of the patient and of the caregiver. Case studies will be presented to illustrate the benefits and the tragedies that accompany alarmed devices. And lastly, we will explore some strategies and technologies designed to make the hospital setting a safer and more pleasant environment.

C4 Critical Diagnoses in CT: How to Make Them!

Computed tomography (CT) is widely used for the diagnosis of critical and life threatening diseases. Although the radiologist report may provide the diagnosis, a basic understanding of image interpretation is necessary to gain a full understanding of the extent of disease and may help with patient management. This presentation will provide background information on CT physics, patient preparation, anatomy, and highlight several critical diagnoses including pulmonary embolism, aneurysm, hematoma, aortic dissection, pneumothorax, and tumor. At the end of the presentation, audience members will feel comfortable with image interpretation of these basic diagnoses.
